Dear Parents and Carers,

With one week to go until the end of term, it was a pleasure to see years 7 to 11 celebrate their many achievements (both inside and outside the classroom) in an extended 'Celebration Assembly' this morning with awards for 'Engaged Learners', 'DHBs' and much more besides. # CyberFirst Girls

The competition ran from the 20th-29th November. The CyberFirst Girls Competition aims to inspire girls interested in technology to pursue a career in cyber security. The competition is a team event. Each team – consisting of up to four girls in Year 8 – tackle challenges from cryptography and logic to artificial intelligence and networking for the chance to be crowned cyber security champions.

29 girls competed in groups of 4 (making 8 groups), There are 55 girls in the year. They thoroughly enjoyed doing the challenges!







UK BEBRAS National Computing Competition

This year, 475 year 7 to year 12 AGS students took part in the UK BEBRAS Computing Challenge. This introduces computational thinking skills to students and allows them to complete a range of challenges designed to test their problem-solving abilities. BEBRAS is organised in over 60 countries and is designed to get students all over the world excited about computing.

38% of AGS students achieved a Gold Award, scoring within the top 10% of the country and as such will be invited to take part in the Oxford University Computing Challenge in February. The highest possible score achievable was 200 and one of our year 7 students, Eliot (Year 7) achieved this making him one of only 99 students out of 117,467 nationally to do so.

Overall in AGS, 126 (27%) students achieved a Distinction, 122 (26%) students achieved a Merit

and 226 (48%) students achieved a Participation award. Students had a great time taking part in the competition and many of them spent their lunchtimes practising the tasks in IT rooms which were made available to them for this purpose.

There was a real buzz of minds solving puzzles and a clear sense of achievement evident.

We could not be more proud of how students threw themselves wholeheartedly into this and of everything they have accomplished.









EcoSoc Tree Planting

In a fantastic display of community and environmental

stewardship, EcoSoc (accompanied by Mr Gill and Miss Kaval)

visited Coldcomfort woods to join forces with St. Benedict's to support students from Our Lady Primary in planting trees.

Despite the muddy terrain, the eco-warriors remained enthusiastic and determined, resulting in 97 trees of varying species being planted!

The collaboration between the local schools showcased a dedication to improving their local environment and highlighted the power of collective action. Each tree planted by the students represents a commitment to sustainability from our future generation. A big thank you to Liz from LEAF, a local organisation who supported us in obtaining the trees and St Benedicts and Our Lady Primary for joining us in planting the trees.

### Junior Ambassadors for School Programme

They will be working in teams to develop their leadership and communication skills. Junior Ambassadors will be researching topics that are relevant in Europe and the UK. They will then organise sessions to deliver this information to KS3 students during life sessions next term. # Coventry City Mission - Giving Tree

In October, we were thinking of ways to be charitable at Christmas time. We realised that many forms do an annual Secret Santa, which is consistently met with amazing feedback year on year. If they are bringing in gifts for people they might not know in their form, why not do the same for people who would otherwise get nothing at Christmas time? The decision was to select Coventry City Mission (CCM) as the recipient for our collection; they run a Giving Tree event every Christmas, enabling the children of Coventry and surrounding areas to be given at least 1 present (when they otherwise wouldn't have been able to receive one). The charity even allows the parents to get involved with wrapping the presents for their kids, to have a sense of ownership and so that they too can feel what it's like to give their child a gift and be filled with happiness at Christmas.

The children who will receive the donated gifts are up to the the age 17, so all of the students had some idea of what would make for an amazing Christmas gift. The gifts were mostly focused on teenagers, but all age groups weren't overlooked.

From all forms across Years 7-11, on top of contributions from parents and many teachers, we received around 50 individual gifts, and in addition raised over £200 in cash so that we could purchase exactly what CCM was hoping for. We send huge thanks to everyone who donated, helping those who need it most to enjoy the wonder of Christmas. We would also like to thank Mrs Dolphin, who helped us to organise everything perfectly, and the prefects for enabling this admittedly huge task to be a success, and making this dream a reality.






